Implementation Partners

List each partner and explain how they were involved in the project

We had two main implementation partners for this project.

First and foremost was the RED AMA, the Amazonas Private Conservation Network, which was the main target of our activities in this project. The RED AMA was involved in nearly all project activities, including planning and decision-making, where relevant. For instance, the RED AMA was involved in the creation of TORs for key consultants such as the RED AMA coordinator and the scholarship recipients. For the RED AMA coordinator, they were also involved in the hiring process. They also determined the ecotourism pilot routes, the emblematic legal cases to be dealt with, as well as main inputs for the policy proposal. They also determined the content of the project proposals for which we supported them in grant-writing.

The second partner was the social enterprise Shiwi, which was hired as a consultant to handle the sales and marketing aspect for the eco-products from the RED AMA private conservation areas. Shiwi also planned and executed the capacity-building workshops for honey and brown sugar producers.

Conservation Impacts

Summarize the overall impact of your project, describing how your project has contributed to the implementation of the CEPF ecosystem profile

RED AMA, and as a result, private conservation in Amazonas, has been significantly strengthened as a direct result of this project. For the first time, RED AMA had a coordinator, a role that became so vital in improving the functioning of the organization that they have included it in their new grant proposals. RED AMA is now better versed in dealing with legal threats through our trainings, and is also equipped with tools such as the pro bono legal counsel to deal with diverse legal issues. They have also build their capacity to design, plan and get funding for their own projects, having successfully received two grants as a result of our training in grant-writing. They are focusing in particular on tourism, for which they have also received capacity-building and support in marketing from us, resulting in steady and significant increases in visitor numbers. Due to the strong communications aspect of our work, which included the first ever travel guidebook for Peru's privately protected areas, RED AMA has an ample portfolio of marketing material that they can continue to use to market their tourism potential. Meanwhile, producers of honey and brown sugar also saw increased sales as a result of our efforts, including various new sales points in Lima and other cities, and benefited from capacity-building in production methods. Finally, a policy proposal has been delivered to and discussed with SERNANP, the National Protected Area Service, which, based on input from PPA managers, government, civil society and academia, lays out our proposed changes to the current legal framework, in order to better incentivize and support voluntary conservation in Peru.

The long-term objective of our project is the conservation of biodiversity in the Amazonas department in the Northeastern Biodiversity Corridor through a network of privately protected areas that is capable of using the legal framework for private conservation to its advantage	The legal aspects of our project have significantly strengthened RED AMA's abilities to understand legal matters and address threats to their individual PPAs, as shown by their active participation in our legal workshops, as well as the ad-hoc legal cases addressed throughout the project period. They also successfully harnessed the support of a pro bono legal studio.
Achieve financial sustainability through entrepreneurship and fund-raising	We have helped RED AMA take significant steps towards this long-term goal. RED AMA now has around USD 25,000 of project funds that supports both specific activities, as well as basic administrative costs for the continued functioning of the organization, and importantly, funds for a coordinator, which follows up from our CEPF project. Furthermore, the PPAs practicing ecotourism and selling ecoproducts have increased their sales/visitor numbers. RED AMA is also discussing the implementation of a membership fee, which would help cover basic costs such as bank accounts and legal matters. There is, however, the continued need to further strengthen financial sustainability of the network, and SPDA will seek further projects in the future to collaborate with RED AMA on this issue.

We will continue to follow up on this, given also our MOU with SERNANP until 2021 that outlines our support to them in this issue, among others. We are optimistic that with the new administration led by Fabiola Muñoz in the Ministry for Environment (since April 2018), there will be more political will for implementing some of the changes we have suggested for improving the legal framework for private conservation. The previous administration had shown very little initiative for supporting private conservation beyond mere recognition of newly created PPAs. However, their most important achievement has been the approval of their LOI for the CEPF- Profonanpe Small Grant for around USD 18,750. This project was the direct result of our work with them through the two grant-writing workshops as well as follow-up support provided. Importantly, the grant will allow continuity from the activities in our current project, in particular, in further strengthening their eco- tourism capacities as well as financing an internal administrator, which turned out to be an essential element for project success. We are very pleased with the impact we were able to have in building fund- raising and project management capacity of RED AMA. The RED AMA has been very pleased with the ecotourism business and marketing plan, called the "Plan para potenciar el desarrollo del turismo sostenible en las áreas de la RED AMA", which has served them as a guideline on how to go on to develop ecotourism in their PPAs and as a network. It has served them to liaise with local government, other NGOs and businesses, and they have expressed their interest in updating the information in it with their upcoming own projects on ecotourism. The plan served to prioritize and plan the pilot tourism routes, and will also guide the activities of RED AMA's new project with CEPF. Our partnership with the Shiwi social enterprise was a successful strategy for marketing honey and brown sugar from the RED AMA PPAs. Sales increased steadily throughout the project period, despite setbacks such as the flooding in early 2017 that halted the supply chain, and changes in rainy seasons that affected honey production in some PPAs. In early 2018, a wildfire devastated PPA Milpuj- La Heredad, which has led to the loss of most of that PPAs beehives. Overall, on average, there was 99% increase in sales, and a 46% increase in income to the PPA producers - based on the average sales per semester after July 2016 (project start). Sales in the first half of 2016 (pre-project) being USD 4690.00, of which USD 2987.50 was income for PPA producers. After the project started, average sales per semester were USD 9348.50, of which USD 4,369.50

PPA producers' income was as follows: \$6,370.00 (2016 second half), \$3,420.00 (2017 first half), \$4,330.00 (2017 second half), \$3,358.00 (2018 first half). All six project were completed, with excellent results. We also created a new webpage to show-case the work of the scholarship recipients. We hope to raise further funds in the future to keep sponsoring similar mini- projects under the umbrella campaign "Conserva Peru". http://www.conservamos.org/conservaperu/ The projects were: 1) GIS expert: Creation of maps and deforestation monitoring system for RED AMA. 2) Legal assistant: Support to our main legal expert in all legal components of this project. 3) Film maker: Production of short films for RED AMA. 4) Eco-architect: Renovation plan for cabin at Hierba Buena Allpayacu, and plans for modular cabins for any PPA. 5) Ecotourism: Capacity-building in hospitality at priority PPAs in ecotourism routes. 6) Administration: Training and guidance material on business formalization and accounting. 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Describe the success or challenges of the project toward achieving its short-term and long-term impact objectives

We were able to reach all of our project goals and impacts. RED AMA now has improved understanding of how to use the legal system not only to respond to threats, but also for the creation of new PPAs. Meanwhile, three emblematic legal cases were dealt with and published on our website, as well as discussed on a continous basis with RED AMA. Next, SERNANP is now equipped with a proposal to improve the legal system for private conservation, which we will follow up on in the future. We have an MOU with SERNANP that includes providing legal support for private conservation, and we are part of a newly created working group to discuss changes in legislation to improve private conservation in Peru. Furthermore, RED AMA, through our support, was able to raise around USD 25,000 in new project funding, and is currently executing these projects, one of which is a CEPF small grant. We also created business and marketing plans for both ecotourism for RED AMA, as well as for the eco-products, both of which, coupled with capacity-building and our marketing and sales support, resulted in significant increases in income from product sales and increases in visitor numbers. We also implemented a series of mini-projects with young professionals that fed into the various goals of the project - this was an excellent way to increase RED AMA's network of supporters, while generating valuable products such as a guide on how to formalize one's business, or architectual plans for modular cabins for tourists.

Were there any unexpected impacts (positive or negative)?

Both tourism visitor numbers, as well as income from the sale of ecoproducts, were much higher than our initial goal, with which we are very pleased.

As part of Shiwi's socio-environmental business model, they also invested in capacity-building for the producers, therefore, there were several capacity-building workshops with the honey and brown sugar producers involved in this project. For these workshops, the project budget covered all or part of transportation and accommodation costs for Shiwi personnell, while Shiwi covered salary costs in most cases. Benefits for the producers were therefore not only direct winnings, but also capacity-building and access to markets, production facilities and marketing from an existing enterprise.

Some key lessons learned from this project include:

The importance of having at least part-time paid staff in a young organization with the nature of RED AMA. This staff member is in charge of administrative tasks that voluntary members do not have the time or capacity to complete, and is also in charge of fund-raising, which is very time-consuming.
There are large differences in needs, capacities and world views within PPA managers, because in Peru, this includes both community-based conservation areas and private conservation areas. Any projects must respect and take into account these differences.

- The private sector, pro-bono systems and small foundations can be excellent partners for small NGOs. It is important that an organization like RED AMA has quality marketing material to attract support from such entities.

We supported RED AMA in gaining its first funds, but their need for support did not end there: they further required our advice for grant negotiations, project planning, accounting issues etc. These forms of support are very important activities to include in addition to grant-writing support.
Although tourism can be an important source of income for private conservation areas, successful management of this resource includes learning about hospitality, creating appropriate accommodation, dealing with dietary needs of tourists, creating good itineraries and tours for visitors, dealing with accounting and formality, distribution of income and allocating a proportion of this to conservation efforts, and much more. We have tried to deal with many of these issues in this project, however, we see the continued need to support RED AMA in developing its tourism capacities and skills.
